Teacher, doctors and researchers all agree that family meal times are important. Many times parents feel guilty for night having regular evening meals because of schedules, job requirements and other commitments that family members may have. A study from Cornell University looked at all of the research on family meal times and found three things that are the most important in having a family meal time that benefits your child the most. The top recommendation is to have family meal time at least 3 times per week, and it doesn't always have to be an evening meal. This can be a family breakfast or a special evening snack if that works best for your family. Secondly, remember that there are many benefits for doing family meals. This helps with closeness and provides your child with stability even if it is hectic or disorganized. Lastly, is to remember that the quality of the family meals is more important than the quantity. This is an important time to communicate with your child, so eliminate distractions. A quality meal time means turning of the TV and cell-phone. Use this family meal to instill your priorities and beliefs in your children.

With our annual Veterans Day program quickly approaching on Friday, November 11th, it is important that students know a little history about some of the veterans memorials located in Washington, D.C.



Korean War Veterans Memorial

Our nation honors those who were killed, captured, wounded or remain missing in action during the Korean War (1950 -1953) with 19 figures that represent every ethnic background. The statues are supported by a granite wall with 2,400 faces of land, sea and air support troops. A Pool of Remembrance lists the names of the lost Allied Forces.



Vietnam Veterans Memorial

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial is a 2-acre national memorial in Washington, DC. It honors U.S. service members of the U.S. armed forces who fought in the Vietnam War, service members who died in service in Vietnam/South East Asia, and those service members who were unaccounted for during the War.



National World War II Memorial

The World War II Memorial is a memorial of national significance dedicated to Americans who served in the armed forces and as civilians during World War II. Consisting of 56 pillars and a pair of small triumphal arches surrounding a plaza and fountain, it sits on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., on the former site of the Rainbow Pool at the eastern end of the Reflecting Pool, between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument.



Marine Corp Memorial

The United States Marine Corps War Memorial is a national monument in Arlington, Virginia, United States. Dedicated 62 years ago in 1954, it is located in Arlington Ridge Park, at the back entrance to Arlington National Cemetery and next to the Netherlands Carillon. The war memorial is dedicated to all U.S. Marine Corps personnel who have died in the defense of the United States since 1775.



Arlington National Cemetery

Arlington National Cemetery is a United States military cemetery in Arlington County, Virginia, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C., in whose 624 acres the dead of the nation's conflicts have been buried, beginning with the American Civil War, as well as reinterred dead from earlier wars. The United States Department of the Army, a component of the United States Department of Defense, controls the cemetery.

"In the best classrooms, grades are only one of many types of feedback provided to students." – Douglas Reeves

When you ask your student how they are doing in school, you probably want to know what their grades. Remember, although their grades give an indication of what they have learned, the process of their learning is also important. Take the time to let your student see your interest goes beyond the grades. Let them know you are just as interested in what they are learning. Below are a few ways to accomplish this:

- Ask about the book they are reading; also when they are reading for leisure. Can they give you a summary of the plot? Does the story remind them of anything in life?
- When they take a test. Don't ask about the grade. Instead, ask if they think the test was a good way to measure how well they knew the material? Why or why not?
- Regarding class in general. Ask about their accomplishments. How did they handle the most difficult science or math problem?
- Especially ask if they've had any experiences which have changed their way of thinking. Don't hesitate to share any of your own experiences which might be relevant.

Questions like these show your student you want to know more than just their grades. It shows you care about what they are learning as well. This also lets them know you are concerned about how the develop. Learning is about more than grades.
